I get a nagging sense that we are as a whole adopting and promoting technology for technology's sake in our communications. I cannot possibly connect with all the venues provided for ILA-ACRL communication and keep wondering if I am missing things appearing in one form that might not appear in another. Could we rather focus on purposeful and thoughtful communication offered through a single source as needed?

Outreach Beyond the Chapter

Getting new people to think that joining is a professional obligation and that it's even worth their own money if the institution won't pay.

Mentoring of new professionals, but also at the undergraduate level to encourage librarianship as a career option.

Mobilizing the connections we make into meaningful change outside of the organization. For example, can we educate others about what we do? Can we affect legislation? Can our voices be heard in audiences that are not entirely academic librarians?

Outreach to non-members, especially new to Iowa at small institutions.

Involvement / Service

In addition to wanting to have more of an impact outside of the organization (i.e. within ILA, ALA, and other non-library environments), I would like the work I do within ILA/ACRL to be valued more than it is by my institution.

I really want to see all of the academic libraries in Iowa working together to provide high-quality services across the state--learning from each others' information literacy successes and failures, forging stronger and more efficient resource-sharing systems, collaborating on the development of software that meets our libraries' needs--and I want to be part of making that happen. I feel like I do get to learn from other libraries through ILA/ACRL, but I don't get the opportunities for collaboration that I wish I did through it.

One suggestion: I do not attend the ALA conferences because of time and budget limitations, so a recap of the conference that focuses on issues relevant to ILA/ACRL members, provided by a member who did attend, would be helpful.

When I think of ILA-ACRL, I think of a more localized conversation about academic librarianship, one that can be more specific than "big" ACRL because of the many similarities the Iowa schools have to each other (setting aside the Regents institutions from that). I feel like I can make connections electronically and at the spring conference, but the geographic distance combined with scheduling issues makes it difficult to participate more fully or intentionally in some cases. I'm not sure that would be solved with an electronic tool (Google hangout or Skype); and I would honestly rather see people face-to-face. I really enjoy being part of a state-wide group, thanks for your efforts in making it all that it can be!
